Congratulations! Now that you have transitioned into adulthood, your health care needs most likely have changed. It may be the right time to consider the transition from your Pediatrician to an adult Primary Care health provider.

What are the differences between a Pediatrician and Primary Care Provider?

A Pediatrician is a type of Primary Care provider that focuses on all aspects of a child's health.

When do I transition?

- Typically, between the ages of 18 and 20
- When health care responsibilities increase beyond a Pediatrician's scope (of) practice

Things to consider when transitioning

- Any preexisting chronic medical conditions which may require a Primary Care provider that specializes in specific medical conditions
- Changes in medical attention which may include:
- Reproductive health
- -Weight management
- -Adult medical screenings
- -Ongoing medication monitoring

- -Adult vaccinations
- -Behavioral health

Things to consider during initial visit with Primary Care Provider

- It is important to be prepared and to know important information pertaining to managing your health. These include:
- -Any allergies that you may have
- -Past medical procedures
- -Past surgical procedures
- -Any medical diagnosis
- -Current medications
- -Vaccination history
- Discuss family history of any chronic conditions
- -Be sure to take notes and ask questions
- Mental Health is an important factor to your overall wellbeing. Discussion with your provider may include:
- -Experience feelings of loneliness or isolation
- -Feelings of anxiety and/or depression
- Problems with sleep or change in sleep patterns
- -alcohol, tobacco, and/or illicit drug use



Recommended Vaccination List

Refer to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention website and your Primary Care provider for additional guidelines, as vaccination schedules may be dependent on vaccination type, age, or condition.

• Influenza- Annually
